MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL: JUDITH DADSON

Welcome to the Bridgetown Primary School's 2023 Annual School Report which contains a range of information to meet Federal Government Reporting requirements by schools. This Report provides a summary of the school's performance and highlights for the year, with a focus on student achievement. It also provides a snapshot of many of the other activities and events students participated in over 2023.

Bridgetown Primary School is proudly an Independent Public School (IPS) having achieved this status in 2014 and commencing 2015 as IPS. The school completed its third Business Plan at the end of 2023. The school continued to analyse internal data and NAPLAN data to reflect on the achievement of set targets across the school and used this information for determining targets and milestones for the 2024 – 2026 Business Plan.

The school is fortunate to have staff who are professional, committed, collaborative and enthusiastic. They are also very self-reflective and regularly look for ways to self-improve and for ways in which our school can improve. Our staff provide high quality teaching and support for all students in our care, whilst encouraging students to aim high and do their best. Bridgetown Primary has a positive relationship with our school and wider community, and benefits from strong community support.

Bridgetown Primary School has continued to further develop and embed Explicit Instruction and Daily Reviews into the culture of our whole school pedagogy. The school continued to provide additional support in literacy to identified students through the MiniLit (Year 1 – 3) and MacqLit (Year 4 – 6) programs which are research based and presented to small groups of students. I am very proud of the culture of continual improvement in teaching practices that has been developed and embedded by our teaching staff.

The Resilience Project program which supports the wellbeing and positive mental health of children was implemented at Bridgetown PS in 2022, for students across Pre-Primary to Year 6. The program was continued in 2023 with our students continuing to focus on Gratitude, Empathy and Mindfulness. The feedback from students, teachers and community is that the program effects on our young peoples' mental health has been very beneficial.

Our School Board and P&C are very important parts of Bridgetown Primary. The members of both these groups work to ensure the very best positive outcomes for our school and students. I would like to sincerely thank all Board and P&C members for their time and commitment to our school throughout 2023. In particular I extend my thanks to the Board Chair, Ms Elissa Klaassen and the P&C President, Mrs Libby Burgess.

Our School Chaplain, Mrs Mary Taylor, continued to provide pastoral care to our students, staff and parents in and with assistance from a small group of volunteers, operated the ever popular Breakfast Club two mornings per week. Mrs Taylor retired from her position here at the end of 2023 after seven years with us. We cannot thank Mrs Taylor enough for her outstanding commitment to Bridgetown PS, our community and the wider community. She was very focussed on providing support to our students and their families, and was very generous with her time.

I invite you to read the 2023 Annual School Report and join the school in celebrating another successful and rewarding year. Within the Report you will find a range of graphs, tables and photographic evidence that demonstrates our school's achievements. I look forward to continuing to work with you as we strive to provide quality education for all students, enabling them to take responsibility for their own direction and to adapt to a changing world.

Thank you to all our volunteers for another amazing year that has seen the P&C contribute even more to our students at Bridgetown Primary.




SCHOOL CONTEXT

Index of Community Socio Economic Advantage

The Index of Community Socio-Educational Advantage (ICSEA) was created by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) specifically to enable fair comparisons of National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) test achievement by students in schools across Australia.

According to Australian Bureau of Statistics for 2023 our rating is 1021 compared to our 2022 rating of 1028 making Bridgetown Primary School above the Australian average of 1000. The ICSEA rating considers family background including parental occupation, levels of education and non-school education levels achieved. The table (below) is taken from the My School website and shows our enrolment profile for 2022.

Please note that when 'like schools' comparisons are referred to in this document, they are made with schools with a similar ICSEA.



The 2023 Distribution of Students shows Bridgetown PS had 29% in the bottom quarter which has increased from 24% in 2022. The total percentage of 53% across the two middle quarters is a drop from 2022.

The top quarter percentage decreased to 18% from 20% 2022

Student Enrolment

The table below displays the total enrolment at each year level and the total student enrolment at the August student census in 2023. This was a nett decrease of 11 students from 2022 enrolments. A total of 3% of students attending our school identified as Indigenous, while 9% of students identified as being from a language background other than English (LBOTE). Our overall enrolment numbers continue to decrease with larger numbers departing the school at the end of Year 6 than we are enrolling in kindergarten for the following year.

Attendance

Regular attendance is an important factor in student success at school. The Department of Education sets a minimum requirement of 90% attendance. Our aim is to have as many students as possible attending above this benchmark. In 2023 Bridgetown Primary had an overall attendance rate of 89.3%.

'Authorised versus Unauthorised Absences' continued to be of concern in 2023. With increased effort from the school Authorised absences saw a positive movement to 89% (86% in 2022) which is a positive upward movement but there remains room for further improvement. We are particularly concerned about two factors in non-attendance by students: frequent, non-essential absences (not medical or emergency) and students being withdrawn from school during the school term for vacations.

Our school community places a high priority on regular school attendance. The school will continue to be encouraging and advocating regular student attendance throughout 2024 and following up on unexplained absences, as a priority. Individual Attendance Case Management Plans will be established for students whose attendance falls below 75%.

Percentage for Primary Year Levels

The attendance of students at Bridgetown Primary School is mostly equal to or greater than the rest of the state.

Three students attained 100% attendance for the 2023 year, whilst other thirty-nine students (fifteen in 2022) attained an attendance of between 95% and 99.5%. Our school sms app, Class Dojo, email and phone calls are used by parents to notify of student absences.

The school regularly sends home letters to parents requesting them to supply the school with reasons for student absences when no reason has been forwarded to the school.

Our regular attendance over 2023 averaged 58.7% up from 49.8% in 2022.

This very low percentage was due to the impact of five students with severe non-attendance ranging from 39% to 58%.

Our teaching staff are experienced professionals who have a genuine interest in our students. They have a commitment to working collaboratively to identify priorities, set targets for improvement, and review and analyse studentachievement data. Education Assistants are deployed to support and assist students in K-2 classes.

Special Needs Education Assistants are specifically deployed to respond to the needs of students with disabilities recognised by the Department of Education.

Teachers engage in a minimum six days annually (pro rata) professional learning that takes place on School Development Days. Teachers also participate in other professional learning activities as per TRBWA requirements.

Student Leadership

Our student leadership consists of Student Councillors and Faction Captains. From the Student Councillor group the Year 6 students vote for two Head Students. As in previous years our Student Leadership Team were great role models for their peers and assisted staff across the school, in both school and out of school events.










Bridgetown Primary utilises the Progressive Achievement Tests (PAT) produced by the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER) in the areas of English and Mathematics to monitor student achievement. The PAT Tests are a series of tests designed to provide objective, norm referenced information to teachers about their students skills and understandings in a range of key areas. The assessments are undertaken by students in late November and accessed via an online platform.


The overall data is scrutinised by teachers at the end of the year to look at possible trends and to ascertain how our cohorts are tracking in comparison to the normed National Median score. In Term 1 individual student data is analysed by teachers in their class group where they isolate areas of weakness and also identify target students who have the potential to make positive gains.

The data collected during the November testing cycle is added to our data sets. Our ability to compare students' achievements against an Australian norm assist in providing a clearer picture of where we need to improve.

A visual representation of this information is provided in boxplots. A boxplot is constructed of two parts, a "box" with "whiskers" on either end of the box. The lowest point is the minimum of the data set and the highest point is the maximum of the data set. Within the box, a line is drawn to represent the median of the data set.



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





Mathematics Year 2 ~ 2023









The PAT results show that our students performed stronger in Reading than Mathematics when compared with the normed 50th percentile.

Despite the lower rankings in Mathematics our students still performed close to the normed 50th percentile.

The use of data to inform planning and teaching will continue to be a priority for Bridgetown Primary in 2024 across learning areas. This will include a continued focus on consistent whole school approaches to the explicit teaching of synthetic phonics through the Letters & Sounds program, the use of decodable readers across Pre-Primary to Year 2, and 'Talk for Write' and 'Science of Learning' strategies for Writing. We will also continue with Year 3 – 6 using a combined approach to Writing using '7 Steps to Writing Success' and 'Science of Learning' strategies.

Across Years 3-6 the school continued to use SoundWaves for the teaching of Spelling. Following interrogation and reflection on our 2023 data, the school made the decision to move to an evidenced based spelling program. Alternative programs were researched and the school selected Spelling Mastery for implementation across Years 3-6. The program is prescriptive and therefore teacher variability in delivery is

Teachers continued to implement the Writing and Grammar Scope and Sequence documents developed in 2022.

The Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) approach to Writing trialled in 2022 across Years 3 – 6, clearly showed positive student gains within their writing texts, so we continued with PLCs in 2023. To this we added 'BrightPath' which is an endorsed DoE formative assessment for student performance and moderation in writing. Teachers from Pre-Primary to Year 6 were provided with professional learning in the use of Brightpath and the school added this strategy to our assessment data collection in 2023. The school will continue to work with PLCs and Brightpath in 2024.

In Reading this year we added the explicit practice of reading fluency to support the development of reading expressively with accuracy and at a good pace. This was added as fluency is one of the key components of learning to read and impacts on comprehension of texts. To further add to our data on student reading ability, including comprehension, the school moved from the use of PM Benchmark and Probe and implemented Acadience from Pre-Primary to Year 6 for reading assessment. Acadience is a diagnostic assessment and assists in identifying areas of student weakness.

Reading intervention continued to be a focus in 2023 with the use of MacqLit (comprising of MiniLit and MultiLit) an evidence-based intervention program. The program was facilitated by our Education Assistants to small groups of students who required additional support and intervention in literacy. Students identified from of combination of teacher judgement supported with data from Acadience and PAT Reading from Years 2 – 6 participated in this program. The positive impact of this intervention was evident with significantly improved PAT results for individual students from 2022 to 2023 assessment results. Bridgetown Primary will continue to provide literacy intervention using MacqLit in 2024.

In Mathematics, teachers continued to implement our school Mathematics Scope and Sequence. This assisted in ensuring that all aspects of the curriculum were being addressed and allowed for additional moderation opportunities of student work samples. Additionally, we continued our focus on explicit teaching of fluency and calculation strategies, along with word problems that need to be 'pulled apart' and solved, as this approach seems to be supporting positive outcomes for our students. Students from Years 3- 6 who were identified as being more capable in Mathematics participated in either Maths Games and Maths Olympiad, across the school year. The use of the Scope and Sequence and extension of students will continue in 2024.

National Assessment Program Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN)

Students from Year 3 and Year 5 participated in NAPLAN in May. All assessments were online, except for the Year 3 Writing which was completed using paper and pencil.

The table below compares the mean (average score) achieved in the assessed areas by Bridgetown PS students as compared to students from 'Like Schools' and 'All WA Schools'.

The table shows that our Year 3 students performed exceptionally well in the 2023 NAPLAN assessments, achieving a higher mean across all assessment areas compared to Like Schools and All WA Schools.

Our Year 5 students also performed exceptionally well in the 2023 NAPLAN assessments, achieving a higher mean across all assessments compared to Like Schools and higher than All WA Schools in three assessments and only one point below in the other two assessment areas.

This was an outstanding result for Bridgetown Primary across both our tested NAPLAN cohorts!


Student Progress

Student Progress and Student Achievement are both reported on in NAPLAN over time periods. For Year 3 students the time period is from Pre-Primary On Entry Testing to Year 3 NAPLAN assessments.


Due to NAPLAN assessments being moved nationally to Term One from 2023 there is no 'progress' data available for the Year 5 students. This is because they undertook NAPLAN as Year 3 students in Term Two 2021.

Progress levels are equally important as achievement levels as these can identify students who are not progressing to their full ability. The graphs below indicate student progress from On Entry Assessment conducted in Pre-Primary in 2020 to NAPLAN in Year 3 in 2023, as compared to Like Schools, which are represented by the black dotted lines. It is evident that our students progressed at a higher level in reading. Further work is needed on identifying target groups of students for case management.


Year 3 Proficiency Levels ~ Numeracy




On Entry to Year 3 Progress ~ Numeracy




Year 5 Proficiency Levels ~ Numeracy




Year 3 Proficiency Levels ~ Reading




On Entry to Year 3 Progress ~ Reading




Year 5 Proficiency Levels ~ Reading

Student Achievement

The graphs above indicate student achievement for our Year 5 students for 2022 NAPLAN assessments in Numeracy and Reading, as compared to Like Schools, which are represented by the black dotted lines. It is evident that our students achieved at a higher level in reading.

Summary

Whilst there is always further work to be done and areas/groups of students that need additional focus, the overall results for both the PAT and NAPLAN assessments are very positive for the students from Bridgetown PS. Our students are performing well compared to the 'norm mean' and 'Like Schools' that form our comparatives.
